Pastor's Notes

Advancing God's Love and Justice

Greetings friends, When we first moved into our house, some of the window seals had shown evidence of breaking, because the glass was quite foggy. We got a small concession from the seller, but hadn't spent the time to look into options, fearing how much it was going to cost to fix them. Over time, the problem got worse. The windows got even harder to see through, and as more of them were affected, it became apparent that the windows had not been installed correctly across the board.

This week, we replaced the worst offenders, the windows on the back side of our house, and it is like night and day! We can see our neighbors. We can see down the street. We can see the various greens of the trees' new leaves (except for our Maple that appears to have died - there's always something). We can watch the birds come to our bird feeder from several new vantage points, and our 8-year-old can actually open his window now! (It was too stiff for him to open, previously.) We have a completely different viewpoint on the world, even from the familiarity of a house we've lived in for 11 years.

What does that mean—to have a different view of the world, even from a familiar vantage point?

We're all spending A LOT more time at home now, not just because we're working or going to school from home, but also because we're not able to travel. And as beneficial as travel is, and as helpful as it is to get new perspective on things, what does it mean to look at something familiar, but see it in a new way?

People are constantly growing, and changing, as they experience new things. If we don't let ourselves see them in a new light, we lock them into a version of themselves that doesn't fit any more. As a parent, I sometimes fail at this - looking at one of my kids and reminiscing about them as a baby or toddler while they wince at me, wanting to be seen as the more mature and capable version of themselves that they are now. I do this, even though I too have experienced the frustration of being looked at through lenses of the past.

On a larger scale, some folks these days are looking at the world through the framework of what was - expecting to go back to "normal," when this is all over. But to disregard what we're experiencing is to fail to see the world as it is. We've now lost twice as many people to COVID-19 as we did in Vietnam. Vietnam affected multiple generations - in how we understand our relationships with each other, how we relate to government, how we understand our responsibilities as citizens, etc., etc. We need to recognize that while the world may seem familiar, this pandemic should change the way we see it. What might we see, with clearer vision, and a willingness to notice?


New Church FB Group
